

We have an opportunity to buy the National Guard Armory building and adjacent Morton building for \$355,000.00. The value on the tax statement is 600 thousand. Should we pursue this opportunity to expand our museum or let it go? I am currently searching for grants to buy the building. No luck so far. The building would give us the ability to showcase more of our artifacts and the history of Aitkin County. The garage area of the building is set up as a wood shop with vacuums for the machines. We could operate a wood shop for seniors to use. Our building on 1st Street N.W. could be sold and everything moved to one location.

Another thing to consider is that we will probably receive title to the land under the depot and other display building this year. We could add on to our second building. The biggest thing is finding additional ways of making money to cover the expenses of the Armory. Give me your thoughts. This is a decision that I believe everyone should voice their opinion on.

Not only would the Armory give us an opportunity to display more artifacts, it would give us a chance to create a research facility which would include our library and a genealogy department. Our office could be located in one location instead of spread out throughout the museum. The possibilities for displays are endless, but do we need it?

During the end of March and the first week in April we had four groups of 4 and 5 year old pre-schoolers from Aitkin come and visit the museum. The parents picked up their children here at the museum. For most, it was their first visit to the museum. A total of 156 students, teachers and parents visited the museum. The children were well behaved and I hope that this will become an annual event.

Our busy season started with the 6th grade tours of the Museum on May 2nd. Two groups of students and teachers from Aitkin came to the museum and learned about life in early Aitkin County. The areas that our presenters shared with the students were: life in a logging camp, railroads, riverboats, genealogy, and the homestead room. The students always get excited when we show them pictures of their relatives, cringe when Boyd talks about the bathing habits of the loggers, and jump when we ring the riverboat bell. We had a lunch for all of the volunteers that help with this event.

Work has already begun on our Annual Garage sale that takes place at the Aitkin County Fair grounds the first weekend in August. Two buildings have been reserved for us to use again this year. Some merchandise has be picked up and/or delivered to the museum and marked for the sale. Before you throw out that old furniture, kitchen cabinets, holiday decorations, tools, sporting goods, books, records, dishes, electronics etc. contact the Depot. **All donations are tax deductible**. This year's display in our Log Cabin at the County fair will be on Aitkin County restaurants. Do you have a unique item from a restaurant from Aitkin County? Please consider letting us borrow it for the display.

Watch for our raffle tickets that will be going out in the mail the first week in June. Check out the list of prizes that we have received so far in this newsletter. Our raffle drawing is our second largest fund raiser of the year. My goal is to at least hit budget this year. We need to sell 2000 tickets. Last year we sold 1917. Help us reach our goal this year.

This spring we need to put new chinking in our log cabin at the fair grounds. Would you like to help with this project? Currently you can look out between the logs. Wind, rain and critters can get into our cabin. This is the second oldest building in the state of Minnesota built especially for a historical society. Let us get a group together and get the cabin fixed before we lose it.

Don't forget about our gift shop when buying gifts for your friends and relatives. We have many coffee table and local history books available. We carry over 200 book titles in our store. Remember, that members receive a 10% discount in our gift shop. Profits from the store go to help fund events at the Depot.

PEACH CARAMEL SHORTCAKE

2 – Cups sifted flour

1 - tsp. salt

1/4 cup shortening

½ cup milk

2 – tbsp. sugar

whipping cream

1 – egg, slightly beaten

fresh slice peaches

3 tsp. baking powder

Caramel Topping (recipe below)

Heat oven to 450 degrees (hot). Grease a sq. pan, 9X9X1 ¾ '. Sift together dry ingredients; cut in shortening. Stir in milk and egg. Pat dough evenly in pan. Crumble caramel Topping over top. Bake 10 to 15 minutes. Cut in squares and serve with fresh peaches and whipped cream.

Caramel Topping: Cream 2 thsp. butter and \(\frac{1}{2} \) cup brown sugar; stir in \(\frac{1}{4} \) cup chopped nuts.

As you can see many new items are now available on our web site. Additional information will be constantly added to our site to encourage return visits. Check it out! What kinds of information should we put on the site? Give us your ideas. We will put another slide show on this spring of our outside area between our two display buildings. If you have the history of one or more of the Townships please share the information so we can add it to our site.

On February 28th I made a trip to Pine City Minnesota to meet with 17 other Administrators for networking together. We formed a group that will be known as "ECHO" (East Central Historical Organizations) to work together to increase our visitor ship. This group comes from seven counties. (Aitkin, Carlton, Pine, Mille Lacs, Kanabec, Chisago and Isanti) We have put together a series of day tours to visit area Museums. Also a brochure, map and web site that will feature all of the group's museums and each museums web site. The new web site and brochures will be in the museums by the end of May. I left home at 7:30 so I could be there at 9:30 when the meeting started. This was a great opportunity for me to meet and spend time with other Museum Administrators to the East and South of us. The only cost to ACHS was a \$10.00 gift out of our Gift Shop for a prize and some mileage. Costs for the map, brochure and website were covered by a Legacy Grant.

During the past year numerous projects were completed that enhanced the look of the Museum. This year we will continue to work on our flower gardens, moving artifacts around outside, and finish replacing the lighting in the Depot building. In this newsletter you will find a list of projects that we will be working on this year. Pick out a project that interests you and give us a hand. This could be by donating either some time or money to the project. Some big projects like the website and completing our micro-film library have been completed. However, the website will continue to change as new information is added.

We received a 30 drawer wood card file cabinet from the **Jesse F. Hallet Memorial Library in Crosby**. This donation saved us from having to buy more 2 draw units for \$100.00 each. By the end of this year that cabinet will be filled and we will need a larger one. Keep your eyes out for possibly a 45 drawer unit. We make out a card for every obituary that we have on file.

Our biggest and most important project this spring is our **Log Cabin** at the County Fair Grounds. We need to scrape out all of the old chinking, fix a bad log and put new chinking between the logs. Our log cabin is the second

oldest building, built especially for the use of a Historical Society, in the State of Minnesota. One building in the State of Minnesota is older by only 1 year. Although we only use this building a couple of times a year it is important to keep maintaining it. It is a big part of the history of the Aitkin County Historical Society. Sentence to Serve has stepped forward and wants to complete this project for us. This donation of time and labor will save the Historical Society thousands of dollars this year and help to preserve the Log Cabin for years to come.

The next biggest project for me is to continue to educate the residents of Aitkin County about the importance of our Society. This encompasses not only membership but the donation of artifacts and information about our County. Everyone must remember that a single small piece of information might be what we are looking for to complete a section of our history or it might tie two pieces of our history together. For example, a photo might have people in it you do not know but what is in the background, such as a business could be what we are looking for. Please remember your local Historical Society when you have photos or information that you are thinking about throwing out. If you are not willing to give them up please consider letting us make copies.

Our **Perennial gardens** need more flowers. If you are thinking about removing some from you gardens please consider donating them to the Depot Museum. Help us to make the grounds around the Depot Museum more beautiful for our visitors. This project has already made a huge difference with the look of the grounds around our display buildings.

ANNUAL GARAGE SALE will be held this year on August 6th & 7th. We have already started to collect items for the sale. When you are cleaning out your house, garage or shed this spring please consider donating those extra items for our sale. We have a big number to beat from last year but I believe that we can do a lot better. But that will not happen if no one donates items for it. If you have a garage sale this spring or summer, donate the items that you have left. Remember that all donations are tax deductible. This is our largest fund raiser of the year. Please help us! I recently picked up 18 apple boxes full of books, record albums, cassettes and 8-tracks for our sale. I also received from the "Mustard Seed" thrift store boxes of excess books for our sale. We will accept anything for our sale EXCEPT: clothes, computers, printers, monitors, and major appliances. We are looking for tools, sporting goods, furniture, old kitchen or bathroom cabinets, book cases, household goods, holiday decorations, jewelry, toys, games, and etc. Items may be dropped off at the Depot Museum or call for us to pick up your donations.

Another project that we have started is a **Lending Library** for our members. We need donations of historical books pertaining to Aitkin County, Minnesota History and World Events (Wars, Immigration, etc). Also, we are looking for books written by local authors. Some local writers have donated copies of their books to be included in our Library. Go through your books in your home and see if there are some you would be willing to donate to the Depot Museum. If this summer, when you are at garage sales, look for books about our area. Pick them up and donate them to the Museum. Not only are we assembling a lending library, but it will also act as a research library. We have received many books about the Civil War, World War II, Military Equipment, Native Americans, Minnesota, and the Railroad. We need books about Logging, farming, immigration, pioneers and riverboats.

Membership is also on our list of projects for this year. More members mean that we will be able to collect more information for our files. It also will give us a broader base of people to draw ideas and volunteers from. During the past year members stepped up and took over the garden project, refurbished a railroad speeder, cleaned up the museum bathroom, made repairs to our buildings and donated a large number of family histories and artifacts. More members also give us the opportunity to spread the need for donating those histories and artifacts to the Historical Society. Talk to your friends, neighbors and relatives and see if they have an interest in Aitkin County history.

We are still looking for information and photos of the **Riverboats** that operated between Aitkin and Grand Rapids. Do you know someone that has in their possession information about the riverboats? If they would donate this information to the Museum or at least let us make copies for our files, have them contact me at the Depot. This information is a huge part of our Aitkin County history. Please help the Historical Society find this history. Check out our web site to see what information we currently have.

Teachers were female and young 1915 Rules for Teachers

- 1. You will **NOT** marry during the term of your contract
- 2. You will **NOT** keep company with men
- 3. You MUST be home between the hours of 8pm and 6am unless attending a school function.
- 4. You MAY NOT loiter downtown in ice cream stores.
- 5. You MAY NOT travel beyond the city limits without the permission of the chairman of the board.
- 6. You MAY NOT ride in a carriage or automobile with any man unless he is your father or brother.
- 7. You MAY NOT smoke cigarettes.
- 8. You MAY NOT dress in bright colors.
- 9. You may UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES dye you hair.
- 10. You must wear AT LEAST two petticoats.
- 11. Your dresses MUST NOT BE ANY SHORTER THAN TWO INCHES ABOVE THE ANKLE.
- 12. To keep the school clean you must:
 - a) Sweep the floor at least once daily
 - b) Scrub the floor with hot soapy water at least once a week.
 - c) Clean the blackboard at least once a day.
 - d) Start the fire at 7am so the room will be warm by 8am.

The school day started at 9am and closed at 4pm with a 15 minute recess morning and afternoon and an hour noon break. The day started with the Pledge of Allegiance and a patriotic song. Assignments in math and other subjects for third grade and up were listed on the blackboard. Class time with the teacher usually ran 15 to 20 minutes, with some combining of grades. Each level had its own spelling books and the seventh and eighth grade students were very helpful in tutoring the little ones. Art, music and physical education were each combined for all grades

If you attended one of the Aitkin County one room school houses, please write down your memories and share them with the Historical Society. Our children, grandchildren and great grandchildren would like to hear about the one room school houses.

CARAMEL BARS

Combine:

- 1 1/4 cups of flour
- 1 1/4 cups quick cooking oatmeal
- 34 cup brown sugar

WORKING ON OUR MISSION

Over the past two and a half years our membership has grown from 246 members to our current 309. I believe that our growth is great. However, the Minnesota Historical Society says we should have closer to 600 members. Crow Wing County's membership is not much different than ours.

Donations to the ACHS of information and artifacts in 2009 were 85 which was a new record. In 2010 we hit 126 donations which shattered 2009's total. This year we are on track to beat that total. It is not just the number of donations that are important but, it is the type of donations we are receiving. Numerous photographs, family histories, and information about past residents and businesses have been received. Also many unique artifacts have been received to add to our current and future displays.

Volunteers have been going through our local news papers and pulling out information for our files such as obituaries, births, marriages and events. They started in 1883 and currently are working on 1944. When we started this project we had two drawers filled with obituaries. When completed we will have at least six. Why is this important? This is a huge project that when completed will make it much easier to find information for people doing genealogy searches.

While working on this project we have been able to find information about steamboats, railroads, logging, military, towns, villages, and townships which we have added to our files. Our job is to collect today's history and preserve it for future generations. But, we are going one step farther by going back in our past and collecting that history also.

One of the projects we need to work more on is interviewing our senior citizens. We need to collect their memories of growing up in Aitkin County before they are gone. Some people think that their memories are not important because others remember it differently. However, everyone sees things differently and remembers different details of events that shaped their lives. By putting together people's memories we are able look at events from different angles. This gives us a better understanding of what happened in the past. We need help with this project. If you would like to help with or are willing to be interviewed please contact Greg at the Depot.

Over the past couple of years numerous projects have been completed to improve our facility. New lighting has been added to save energy and protect our artifacts, a handicap ramp and steps to make it easier for our volunteers and visitors to enter the museum. Trim on Depot was scraped and painted, over grown shrubs removed and perennial gardens planted. New custom made book cases were installed in our gift shop. Seventy five book titles were added for sale.

This year we will make repairs to our log cabin, replace our main computer and purchase a new digital camera. We will add more flowers to our gardens, rebuild our second railroad speeder and change out some of our displays. We are currently working on putting together a research and lending library for use by our members.

There is a good chance this year that we will finally own the property under our buildings. I will let you know more in our August newsletter. Until then we will continue working on our mission.

NEWS FROM McGRATH HISTORICAL COMMITTEE

The McGrath Historical Committee, Inc. initially began in 2007 and was incorporated 2009. We are proud to announce we are 501 (c) (3) and officially are a member of the Minnesota Historical Society (MHS) besides sharing information with the Aitkin County Historical Society. We will be hosting our 3rd Annual meeting June 18 to be held at The Holden Church Hall. In the past meetings we had displays of historical information regarding the Schools in Early Years, Old Bank Book, info on our founding father - James E. McGrath, list of the Mayors for the city, military photos, snapshots of the flood in 1950 and we sold tickets for the raffling of the historical quilt. The items on display and raffle tickets being sold also took place on the 4th of July and at the Logging and Threshing Show on the Labor Day weekend. The 2nd Annual Meeting was held at the Presbyterian Fellowship Hall and Dan Hershon, and Denny Mager were present to do appraisals on items brought to the meeting.

At the 2nd Annual Meeting we setup the Microfilm machine which was purchased at the beginning of the year. The McGrath Tribune on microfilm is now available for usage.



An article was written up on Ervin Buck, a fellow Marine, in regards to his military service and submitted and published on the MN Greatest Generation section of the MHS web site. The Centennial Book was written by Carol Bailey and we sold 250

books within a month and had a 2nd and 3rd printing.

Presently we are working with Gerald Wollum from Red Top and the Mille Lacs Historical Society in writing up a book on the SOO Line Railroad. We have submitted information from the McGrath area. I was surprised at how big the operation of the SOO Line was to ride the rails. We are hoping the book will be ready by the end of the year.

The "Amazing Book of McGrath History" is another book we are pulling together. There is an abundance of history and one and two books do not seem to cover it all. History is in the present day times. We have to collect what is happening now for the next generations.

Events this year will include: June 18 - the 3rd Annual Meeting, 12:00 Lunch with Meeting to start at 1:00, 4th of July and the Logging and Threshing Show. There may be one or two more depending on the events in the area.
