

Financial Services Programs


Minnesota Health Care Programs (MHCP)

These programs provide health care coverage to eligible families with children, adults, people with disabilities and seniors




Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program -SNAP (formally known as Food Support/Food Stamps)

- Provides a food supplement to low-income households to expand their food budget
- Max Benefit amount for a household of 4 is \$939



Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP)

- Helps pay for the cost of child care for eligible families using approved child care providers
- The entrance level for a household of 4 is \$55,266.00.




Cash Assistance Programs

- There are five different programs that fall under the Cash Assistance umbrella
 - Minnesota Family Investment Programs (MFIP)
 - Diversionary Work Program (DWP)
 - General Assistance (GA)
 - Minnesota Supplemental Aid (MSA)
 - Housing Supports (HS)


Minnesota Family Investment Program (MFIP) Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)

- Assists low-income families with children to move out of poverty through a focus on employment or stabilization services
- Max benefit amount for a household of 4 is \$782 cash and \$788 SNAP




Diversionary Work Program (DWP)

- Four month, intensive, work focused program for families with children applying for cash benefits
- Max benefit amount for a household of 4 is \$782




General Assistance (GA)

- For persons without children between the age of 18 and 65 who are unable to work for a specific reason
- Max benefit for one person is of \$203




Minnesota Supplemental Aid (MSA)

- Provides financial assistance for persons who are aged 65 or older, blind or disabled with income below the Social Security Federal Benefit Rate (FBR)
- Typical benefit is \$81 monthly



Housing Supports (HS) formally known as Group Residential Housing (GRH)

- Pays for room and board for seniors and adults with disabilities and low income.
- The program aims to reduce and prevent homelessness.
- Max rate is \$1,041



Emergency Assistance Programs

- Two programs are available for eligible families or adults with no children who are in an emergency situation such as an eviction or utility shut-off
- Emergency funds will only be issued if the emergency will be resolved
- Can only be utilized once every 12 months.
- Households must meet specific criteria such as, 50% of their household income was paid to basic needs in the last 60 days.

Emergency Crisis Funds (EA)

- For households who have a pregnant woman or child under 19 still in school
- Federally-funded through MFIP and mandated
- Caseload totals & grants issued:
 - **2**022:
 - 2 cases & \$1,120.25 paid out
 - **2**018:
 - 30 Cases & \$22,007.00 paid out
 - **2**014:
 - 41 cases & \$32,324.00 paid out

Emergency General Assistance (EGA)

- For adults without children in the home
- State-funded and mandated
- Caseload totals & grants issued:
 - **2**022:
 - 5 cases & \$2,320.32 paid out
 - **2018**:
 - 14 Cases & \$6,763.00 paid out
 - **2**014:
 - 36 cases & \$14,081.00 paid out
